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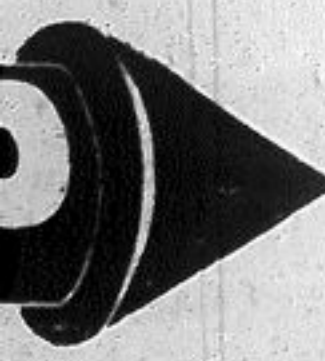

WIDOW GETS £124

Before Judge Barra O Briain, at  
Limerick Circuit Court on Friday  
evening, 5th inst.,

Ellen Meehan, Gortnacreehy, Kil-  
meedy, sought compensation for the  
loss of her husband, while em-  
ployed by John Liston, Gortna-  
creehy, Kilmeedy.

Mr. G. Kenny, B.L. (instructed  
by Mr. R. J. Cussen, solicitor) ap-  
peared for the applicant, and Mr.  
T. K. Liston, B.L. (Messrs. Liston  
and Co.) was for the respondent.

Mr. Kenny said that on the 13th  
July, 1943, the applicants' husband  
was driving a hay-rake when the  
horse bolted and he was thrown  
off sustaining injuries from which  
he died on the 28th September. The  
only question at issue was the  
amount of damages payable to the  
applicant.

The Judge announced that he  
would give his decision as to the  
award on Saturday morning.
