Dear Sir—Referring to the advertisement in a recent issue of your paper, inviting applicants to compete for the position of clerical officer in the Limerick Corporation, permit me to say, as one of a number of candidates who entered for the last Corporation examination, held in May, that neither I nor any of the other entrants, so far as I know, have ever been informed of the result.

So far, the name of the successful candidate has not been disclosed.

Surely a public examination of this sort, where candidates have had to pay an entrance fee of 10/-, together with furnishing a birth certificate, which costs 3/9, it is not unreasonable to expect that they should be notified of the result (as promised by the City Manager at a meeting held on 13/7/'43), together with the markings of their papers, as is done in all public examinations. The very high standard set in the examination papers for the position of junior clerk was described by an auditor friend of mine as "monstrous."

At a meeting of the Corporation held 13/7/'43, the City Manager was asked by Ald. Reidy if the fees paid by the unsuccessful candidates would be returned. He replied—"the fees cannot be returned for the present."
