MEMORIES OF LIMERICK

Memories of Limerick was the title of Father Moloney's lecture given last Wednesday to a large audience of children in the City Library. Father Moloney began his lecture with a map of Limerick as founded by the Danes. But he also referred back to St. Patrick's visit to Singland. At this point he showed slides of St. Patrick's well at Singland, and of the Bell of Singland. This Bell is in the City Museum and it was shown to the children during the lecture. Some of the children sang a hymn, "Sancte Venite," which was sung in the time of St. Patrick, and which has miraculously survived to the present day.

Other exhibits taken from the Museum were some coins which were in circulation after the Treaty of Limerick, six silver ingot pieces, an ancient brooch, and a twelfth or early thirteenth century Irish Romanesque head carved in sandstone. This head was found in Peter's Cell near the ruins of the old town.

Father Moloney also spoke of old Irish craftsmanship, and he showed slides of wood-carving and metalwork. He then dealt with the growth of the city and showed the familiar remnants of the town's walls.

AWARDED £982

Patrick O'Farrell, E.S.B. Supervisor, Henry Street, Limerick, was awarded damages of £982 10s. by a High Court jury in his personal injury action against the G.S.R., claiming that he was struck by a bus while motor cycling at Rutland Street, Limerick, in February, 1940. Mr. Justice Martin Maguire gave judgment with costs.

OVER 90 YEARS OF AGE

THREATENED CITY STRIKE

Negotiations, initiated by the Mayor (Mr. James McQuane, P.C.), took place to-day with a view to a settlement of the pending dispute involving the small drapery houses in the city. The Distributive Workers Union has served strike notice to take effect on Monday on the ground that the employers had refused to pay a wages bonus recommended by the Minister for Industry and Commerce.

The Mayor has submitted certain proposals to the Employers' Federation with a view to effecting a settlement, and hopes are entertained that the threatened strike will not take place. The employees concerned are to hold a meeting to-night to consider the position. About twenty small drapery houses would become involved should the dispute develop.
