The number of persons in receipt of public assistance in Eire on the last Saturday of September was 98,610, which was 729 less than the previous month, and 2,670 less than on the corresponding day last year. The number of persons in receipt of home assistance was 79,330 or 828 less than the previous month, and 3,039 less than on the corresponding day last year.
