MOTHER OF FOUR PRIESTS

The death has taken place at her residence, New Line South, Charleville, after a brief illness, of Mrs. Ellen Rea, wife of Mr. Daniel Rea, a well-known and highly esteemed citizen. The deceased lady was the mother of Rev. Father J. Rea, P.P., D.D., Bristol; Rev. Michael Rea, C.C., Bristol; Rev. John Rea, C.C., D.D., Professor in Carlow College; Rev. Daniel Rea, C.C., at present Chaplain in India; Commdt. William Rea, Artillery Corps, and Mr. Thomas Rea, N.T., Principal of Charleville Boys National Schools. Another son, Joseph, is a student in St. Kiernan's College, Kilkenny, while another boy, David, who was educated at All Hallows, Dublin, and destined for the priesthood, died some years ago in South Africa.

ELECTRICITY CHARGES

Mr. T. J. Murphy, T.D., has given notice of the following question in the Dail to the Minister for Supplies:—"To ask the Minister for Supplies whether, in the examination of the financial position of the Electricity Supply Board, which preceded the imposition of the recent increased charges, the question was considered of postponing the proposed increases until after the emergency, and of then sanctioning the imposition of such charges as would reasonably recoup the Board for any losses sustained during the emergency period; if not, whether he will at this stage consider the adoption of some such arrangement, having regard to the fact that many consumers are already suffering severe hardship from the increased cost of living in so many directions."

DEATH OF LIMERICK SEA CAPTAIN

The death has occurred, after some months illness, of Captain Stanley Hollinshead, "Carradale," Martello Av., Dun Laoighaire, who was for many years connected with the Irish Lights Service. A native of Limerick, he served in the merchant navy, and during the last war his ship was torpedoed near Belfast. In 1919 he entered the Irish Lights Service as a junior officer and was rapidly promoted, being appointed to the command of the Terne after two years. He later commanded the Isolde and the Alexandra.

FOUND DEAD IN FIELD

When returning from feeding cattle on his farm, Mr. John Hayes, Cloncloher, Kilmore, County Clare, found his brother, Michael Hayes (54), dead, in a field. It was stated that both brothers were working together, and parted some minutes before the discovery was made. Death from heart failure was the inquest verdict returned before Dr. S. Scanlan, Coroner, East Clare.

DIED AT MASS

While attending Mass at Holy Cross Church, Tralee, Mr. James O'Hara, the popular secretary of the Tralee Race Company for many years, got a seizure and died. His wife predeceased him three months ago.
