Wednesday, December 8th—Cattle—Numbers showed a substantial increase on last week; fair entry of beef; medium weight heifers freely bid for and readily cashed; small heifers and bullocks not so much in favour. Prime beef in active demand, and can be sold; fresh young cows readily cashed; current rates; useful strippers sold out; easier rates. In the store section a quieter aspect ruled, the business not as active as last market, with slightly easier tendency in prices, as buyers are out to purchase on the lower basis of rates; harder to place cattle. Rates on the lines of last week's terms; secondary sorts slow and uncertain. Calves—Increased entry; choice heifer calves met a brisk sale and top rates. Heavier volume of business than last week, and a fair clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £26 10s to £29; second run, £21 to £24. Fat cows, best, £22 10s. to £26 15s.; second run, £18 to £21; old, £8 to £15. 2½ year-old bullocks and heifers, £17 10s. to £22 5s.; 1½ year-old bullocks and heifers, best, £14 12s. 6d. to £17; second run, £12 17s. 6d. to £14 7s. 6d. Calves, best, £11 to £14 16s.; second run, £7 15s. to £9 4s. Sheep—Slight decrease on last week, but more good sheep; full company of buyers. Trade opened active and firm for best pens with a free and quick demand at more money than last week, and a ready exchange. Hoggets and wethers of nice quality and well done met steady exchange on satisfactory terms. Useful sheep looked for; ample demand to take all shown; more could have been sold. Fat lambs scarce; the right stamp cashed. Feeders and store lambs slow demand. Young ewes freely bid for; older ewes not in favour. The general run of business firm and brisk. Market cleared except for a few pens. Hoggets, best, 135/- to 153/-; second run, 120/- to 134/-; stores, 95/- to 115/-; ewes, 120/- to 127/-; lambs, small, 70/- to 87/6.—Wm. B.
