suggestion was not acceptable to the parties concerned.

Mr. Scott said that the area could not be properly developed unless the front houses were acquired and demolished.

Acquiring of Publichouses.

Answering Mr. Reddan, the Law Agent said that if public houses were acquired compensation would have to be paid, as the law would not permit licensed premises on a housing scheme.

Mr. Reddan—That is a serious aspect of housing development. It is a serious matter to take away

a man's livelihood.

The Law Agent said that unless the law was amended alternative sites could not be given in respect of licensed premises. It was a problem that called for solution by legislation.

Mayor-We must get our deputies

interested in this matter.

City Surveyor — About eight licensed premises are involved in

the Carey's Road area.

Mr. Manning Robertson said that a similar problem had arisen in Dublin. He believed that this particular aspect of housing development was receiving attention from those concerned.

Mr. Cusack said that the Corporation should make representations in the proper quarter to have alternative sites provided for

licensed premises.

Mr. Reddan endorsed this point

of view.

Mr. Manning Robertson said that he was in entire agreement with Mr. Scott that the houses fronting Lord Edward Street and Boherbuoy should be acquired and demolished. He would like to see the new houses to front the new roadway built in stone. The extra cost should not be very great, as plenty of stone could be obtained from dilapidated warehouses. The demolition of some of these old stores could be carried

Robertson suggested that houses be built in stone, roofed with Irish slates, and that the walls be cavity walls to ensure dryness and warmth. He submitted a perspective sketch showing the general appearance of the houses from the Treaty Stone direction. The design, he said, was in accordance with the general tradition of Irish domestic work and in keeping with the surrounding parts of the city. He expressed the view that it should be possible to build them cheaply from salvaged stone and slates.

After a general discussion, it was decided to eliminate two houses proposed to be built in the rere and to confine the scheme to six houses, which would be accommodated on

the front.

It was also decided unanimously to recommend the Council to have the houses built in accordance with the plan prepared by Mr. Robertson.

The Mayor paid a high tribute to Mr. Scott and Mr. Robertson for the great assistance they had given the Council. He added that Mr. Robertson would visit the city in February to show lantern slides of part of his town planning scheme.

Mr. Scott and Mr. Robertson thanked the Mayor for his complimentary references.
