### IRISH TENOR TO SING IN LIMERICK

People of Limerick will recall with pleasure the last occasion when they were afforded an opportunity of hearing Christopher Lynch, the Rathkeale tenor, who has been making a name with his lovely voice. We are, therefore, glad to learn that we may expect a return visit when he comes to sing at the Savoy on Sunday, January 9th. During the latter part of this year he spent months of intense study and further training, and then crossed to London. In an interview Mr. Joseph Lewis, of the B.B.C., expressed the opinion that a distinguished place awaited him among the leading singers of the day. Last month he made his debut before a London audience, when he was afforded the privilege of appearing at Wyndham's Theatre on a stage crowded with stars. He received a tremendous reception, and although encores were not the order of the day a delighted audience insisted on hearing from him many times. Writing in the "Irish Independent" of Nov. 23rd, the London correspondent said:—"The most popular item to judge by the vociferous applause it evoked was the singing of 'Oft In The Stilly Night' and 'Macushla' by the young tenor, Christopher Lynch, who hails from Rathkeale." In addition to Mr. Lynch music lovers will be afforded an opportunity of hearing Isidore Schlaen, the well-known violinist, who accompanies him on the occasion.

### DISTRICT COURTS

There will be no sitting of the following courts for the present month:—Kilmallock Summary and Civil Bill and Kilfinane Summary.

The Board decided to recommend to the Minister the re-appointment of Mr. Michael Breen as Inspector for the Limerick Fishery District.

A letter was read from the Department stating that the Minister had approved of the Board obtaining an overdraft accommodation within the limit of £2,000 up to 31st March, and a reduced overdraft of £1,500 thence to the 30th September, 1944.

Messrs. Marshall and Macaulay, solicitors, Listowel, wrote expressing appreciation of the services of Det.-Garda J. E. Breslin in a recent fishery prosecution in Listowel, and also for the work performed in connection with the case by acting Inspector Cavanagh, who showed considerable ability in discharging his duties.

Inspector W. Cavanagh, in his report, stated that in the main Feale salmon were spawning in large numbers. The stock of salmon in the Smolta this year exceeded that of last year, and large numbers had entered the Alaghaun.

Inspector M. Breen, in his monthly report, stated that large salmon were hovering around the spawning beds at Castleconnell. Great numbers of peale and medium sized salmon were in the spawning districts of the Mulkear and Newport rivers, and in fair numbers on the Fergus, Inch and Quin rivers.
