A remand to the 31st December was granted.

At to-day's Court an additional defendant, John Leonard, Finlea, Killaloe, was charged with having during the month of July, received 50 gallons of petrol and one fifty-gallon drum, to the total value of £11 11s. 3d., knowing them to have been stolen.

In this case also a remand was granted, bail being allowed.

## PROMISING LIFE CUT SHORT

Master Roger Kennedy, whose death occurred on the 5th inst., was the son of David and the late Mrs. Kennedy, Ballinvirick, Askeaton. Deceased, who was in his 20th year, was a boy with a most loveable disposition and had many fine traits of character that won for him the affection and admiration of all who knew him. He was gifted with rare intelligence and, having read very widely for a boy of his years, he was surprisingly well-informed in regard to matters usually the concern of people of mature years. He had more especially a very fine knowledge of Irish history acquired through private study, which was only as might be expected seeing that he was reared in a home with fine national tradition.

The remains were removed to Cappagh Church on Monday evening and the interment took place in Nantenan Cemetery on Tuesday. The funeral on both occasions was of large dimensions. Rev. R. Dunworth, P.P., read the prayers at the graveside.

## ADARE DANCE HALL

When applications for renewal of dance licences came before him at Adare Court on Tuesday, District Justice Kenny, B.L., said that he would need some evidence before he would renew them. "Have I power to revoke a licence under the Dance Hall Act?" he enquired.

Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor, said that he imagined that the Justice would have this power, and he thought there should be some procedure laid down for doing it.
