DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN JOURNALIST

We regret to announce the death
of Mr. Joseph K. O'Leary, a well-
known journalist, who was a native
of Limerick. He passed away
during the week at his residence,
35 Geraldine Street, Berkeley Road,
Dublin. A genial and very popular
figure, he was a brother of Mr.
Octavius O'Leary, Rathbane, to
whom and the other bereaved re-
latives we extend our sincere
sympathy. The late Mr. O'Leary,
who was a man of great ability,
began his career on the "Munster
News," and later was on the staffs
of various provincial papers, in-
cluding the "Free Press," Wexford,
and the Cavan "Anglo-Celt," of
which he was chief reporter. For
some years he was chief reporter
of the "Daily Express," Dublin,
and was for many years attached
to the staff of the "Evening Mail."
He was also associated for some
years with the reporting staff of
Independent Newspapers, Ltd.

He was father of Mr. E. G.
O'Leary, of the "Irish Field," and
uncle of Mr. M. O. O'Farrell, of the
sporting staff of Independent News-
papers, Ltd. He was a brother-in-
law of Mr. T. K. Walsh, of the
"Anglo-Celt."

The interment took place in
Glasnevin Cemetery.
