THE LATE THOMAS P. O'SHAUGHNESSY.

Following in a fortnight on the lamented death of his father, the decease of Mr. Thomas P. O'Shaughnessy, on 2nd January, 1944, also after a short illness, caused a painful sensation in Glin which was succeeded by general sorrow and regret. He was the eldest son of the late Mr. Maurice J. O'Shaughnessy, and was of fine physique, like his father, whom he resembled. He was a favourite with his old school-fellows and companions, and there was poignant grief amongst them. But he was held in warm affection among the older people, too, for he was simple and straightforward, kind and considerate. He had only arrived home on holiday from London, where he held a responsible position with the L.M.S. Railway Company, the night his father was taken ill, and for the following week was, with his brothers and sisters, a constant attendant on him in the County Infirmary. This double bereavement of the O'Shaughnessy family, the loss of a father still in vigorous manhood, and of a brother not long arrived at it, both lovable personalities, is regarded in Glin as the saddest in this generation.

There was again a large gathering of relatives, friends and the general public at the interment, which took place on Monday, the 3rd January, when he was laid to rest with his father.
