A GREAT PRIEST

Passes To His Reward

A splendid type of the Irish  
priesthood—one whose death we  
very much regret to announce—has  
passed away at St. Joseph's Con-  
vent, Newmarket, Co. Cork, in the  
person of Rev. James O'Neill, late  
P.P. of Dunedin, New Zealand.  
Deceased was a native of Limerick,  
being brother of Mr. Hugh O'Neill,  
pump contractor, a deservedly very  
popular and highly-respected citizen  
and one-time world famous Irish  
dancer. Father O'Neill, who was  
the eldest of thirteen children, had  
reached his 85th year. By special  
permission from Rome he was  
ordained at an unusually early age  
in order to accompany Bishop  
Moran to New Zealand. In that  
country his priestly life was spent  
and it was richly fruitful of good  
works in the causes of religion and  
charity. For many years his activi-  
ties were largely of a pioneer  
character, and through his great  
zeal, energy and enterprise he had  
several churches, convents and  
schools built. In those early days  
travel was naturally very difficult  
and it was an arduous task  
to look after his parish, which was  
larger than the province of Munster.  
Most of his journeys amongst  
his parishioners were done on  
horseback and the difficulties he  
had to surmount in ministering to  
his people were stupendous. His  
heart was in his mission, however,  
and he thought no sacrifice too  
great to make in the service of the  
Master. A fine preacher and cap-  
able writer, as well as a tireless  
worker, he played a hugely impor-  
tant and valuable part in the  
growth and development of the  
Catholic Church in New Zealand.  
His Bishops and fellow-priests held  
him in the highest regard, and his  
popularity amongst the people in  
general was both widespread and  
sincere. On more than one occasion  
the feelings of respect, admiration  
and confidence felt towards him  
were expressed in testimonials and  
addresses from clergy and laity.  
A man of splendid physique, his  
mind and heart were as big as  
his body. For his native land  
he ever cherished the warmest  
love and always took a keen and  
active interest in its welfare. He  
paid a number of visits home, his  
latest and last one being just be-  
fore the present war broke out. As  
a matter of fact, his great anxiety  
for the past few years was to see  
normal times return so that he  
could go back to the scene of his  
life-long labours and many  
triumphs. But God ordained other-  
wise, and now he sleeps his  
last long sleep in the old country,  
of which he was such an ardent  
lover and brilliant son. His inter-  
ment took place on Tuesday  
last at St. Joseph's Convent,  
Newmarket, after Solemn Requiem  
Mass. His death removes a truly  
great priest and a kindly, sociable,  
warmhearted and loveable Irish-  
man. To his brother, Mr. Hugh  
O'Neill, and the other bereaved  
relatives we extend our very sincere  
sympathy in their sorrow.  
The funeral took place on Tues-  
day last, in the Convent grounds,  
Newmarket, after Solemn Requiem  
High Mass, at which Very Rev.  
Canon Wigmore, Kanturk, presided.  
The celebrant of the Mass was Rev.  
Fintan O'Neill, O.Cist., Mount Mal-  
leray, nephew of the deceased. Rev.  
M. Twomey, Newmarket, and Rev.  
J. Casey, C.C., Newmarket, were  
deacon and sub-deacon, respectively;

was master of ceremonies. In the

A BIG FIGURE  
PROMINENT DOCTOR  
PASSES

The death took place recently at  
Portland, Oregon, U.S.A., of Dr.  
James V. Nevin, head of the Re-  
search Department, Harbour Ply-  
wood Corporation, Washington.  
Brother of Mr. Thomas F. Nevin,  
Cornmarket Row, Limerick, decea-  
sed was a native of Cashel, County  
Tipperary. He was father of Rev.  
James Nevin, St. Michael's, Los  
Angeles.  
Dr. Nevin was educated at Rock-  
well, Blackrock and Paris. He went  
to California and took up research  
work. For the past ten years he  
had been actively engaged in re-  
search work in the development and  
utilization of wood waste and the  
improving processes relative to the  
lumber industry in the United States,  
the Harbor Plywood Corporation,  
Washington. He had leased his ex-  
clusive licence rights for his hot  
pressed plywood patents for the  
United States, Canada, Finland,  
Latvia, Germany, Brazil, Poland  
and Australia. His new product is  
being marketed under the trade  
name, "Super-Harbord." The use  
of plastics is making a revolution-  
ary change in plywood manufacture  
and broadening greatly the scope  
of its market; the advance of his  
modern scientific development has  
helped greatly to open up new  
markets for plywood as well as to  
enlarge existing markets. The mod-  
ern trend towards prefabricated  
economically constructed homes  
promises a market expansion. His  
Super-Harbord has been used in  
the construction of railroad cars,  
aeroplanes, buses, auto trailers and  
trucks; likewise in the manufacture  
of incubators and other products  
where ease of handling, light weight  
and ability to stand exposure are  
most important factors, such as in  
farm structures, particularly for  
livestock in the United States.  
Before his death, Dr. Nevin was  
extensively engaged in research  
work in the development of insula-  
tion board and wallboard, or syn-  
thetic lumber, made from the waste  
in the manufacture of plywood and  
other waste woody material.  
Right Rev. Dr. Cantwell, Arch-  
bishop of Los Angeles, paid a very  
high tribute to the late Dr. Nevin  
in Washington. The United States  
Government is at present utilising  
Harbor Plywood in the construction  
of warships and aeroplanes.
