THE PADDOCKS, LIMERICK.

WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, February 2nd—Cattle—A substantial increase in numbers; the heaviest entry for some time. Strong and representative attendance. Good supply of beef, for which demand was brisk, with a ready sale, including young fresh cows. Sharp advance in rates; all cleared. Beef wanted and selling well; stripper cows actively bought. Steady enquiry for useful drafts of feeders, particularly forward lots and bullocks, which were easily cashed at full values. Shipping and local interests operating gave a good "swing" to trade. Proceedings were marked with an evident healthy and firmer tone, and a readiness on the part of buyers to invest; terms were firmer and freer, with an all round hardening in prices. Weanlings, a small entry, choice lots, especially heifers, were in great demand. Mr. P. O'Malley, Rivers, Lisnagry, obtaining a record price of £17 5s. for five particularly choice roan heifers, the purchaser being Mr. D. Condon, Coolshane, Herbertstown, Co. Limerick. Nice weanlings were readily bought up. Steady selling trade throughout the day. Market well sold up. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £29 to £34 5s.; second run, £22 10s. to £26; fat cows, best, £25 to £31 10s.; second run, £21 10s. to £24 10s.; old, £13 5s. to £17; 2 year-old bullocks, £17 5s. to £22; 2 year-old bullocks and heifers, best, £17 10s. to £20 10s.; second run, £11 4s. to £16 5s.; calves, choice, £15 5s. to £17 5s.; second run, £9 5s. to £10 10s.

Sheep—Not quite as heavy a supply, and class hardly as well represented as last week. Trade opened quiet, as the early pens were not of the right quality. Prime wethers and well fed sheep freely bid for, and easily placed; last week's rates fully maintained. Full prices paid for finished sheep. Young fresh ewes a steady trade. Forward store sheep cashed around previous level; ordinary stores quiet. No hoggets on offer. Fresh well-fed sheep in demand and held their prices; secondary and rough sorts tedious. Trade for best sheep well supported, with an early finish and satisfactory clearance. Fat middle weight, 137/6 to 752/6; second run, 105/- to 130/-; ewes, 102/6 to 132/6.—Wm. B.
