DIED IN HARNESS

AS PRESIDENT OF BAND

The passing away of Mr. Bartholomew Dillon (Bartle) removes another link from the No. 1 Boherbuoy National Brass and Reed Band. When I joined the band in October, 1890, Bartle was in his early twenties. In all his years he was ever constant to the needs of the band. His advice for many years past was always sought and he died in harness as president. He also retained his trusteeship of the premises, the last of the lot. The late T. J. Prendergast, B.C., and John Slattery, B.C., were the other two. Bartle was always in his place on practice nights and was never absent in the ranks during the Parnellite campaign either in city or country. The Dillon family had a large connection with the band:—George, the famous euphonium player; his son Peter, who now resides in Ennis, Co. Clare; Joseph, who played a baritone; Thomas, a capable side-drummer, and Bartle, a clarinet player. Tempus fugit, I often look back to those happy evenings when we, young men, were subject to our superiors, viz.: T. O'Brien, bandmaster; T. J. Prendergast, W. Prendergast, G. Dillon and others, all interested in making us good performers. All that now remain of the group of fifteen who joined in October, 1890, are W. P. Ahern, Kansas City, MO., U.S.A.; Joseph Kennedy and the writer.
