WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Wednesday, March 14th—Entry about the same as this day week, including a number of high quality heifers, as well as useful commercial cows, and a general run of nicely bred dairy cows. Attendance not up to last week, but plenty of buyers for the right stamp; weather conditions favourable. Dairy proprietors received heifers nicely brought out, with breeding, the essential points; this description found ready and willing purchasers, with a quick spirited competition, and values well maintained on the higher level for choice cows. Trade for promising and ordinary cows not as active as last market; rough and ugly shaped heifers hard to sell. All round more cautious routine, with a stiffer exchange, as buyers were not willing to meet sellers expectations, and held out for concession in terms. In the cow department the market on sale was not up to last week's high standard; trade quiet. Mr. W. J. Howley, Hill, Lisnagry, well deserved and topped the market at £40, with an outstanding roan cow; this being the highest paid this season; closely followed by Mr. Rd. Smith, Curraghmore, Adare, at £39 10s. Mr. James Keane, Derrra, Kilmore, also got £39 for a nice heifer; several others realising from £36 to £38 10s. Choice heifers, £36 to £40; promising, £28 10s. to £34 10s.; ordinary, £22 to £27 10s.; cows, £26 10s. to £29 10s.; ordinary, £18 10s. to £24 5s.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Limerick.

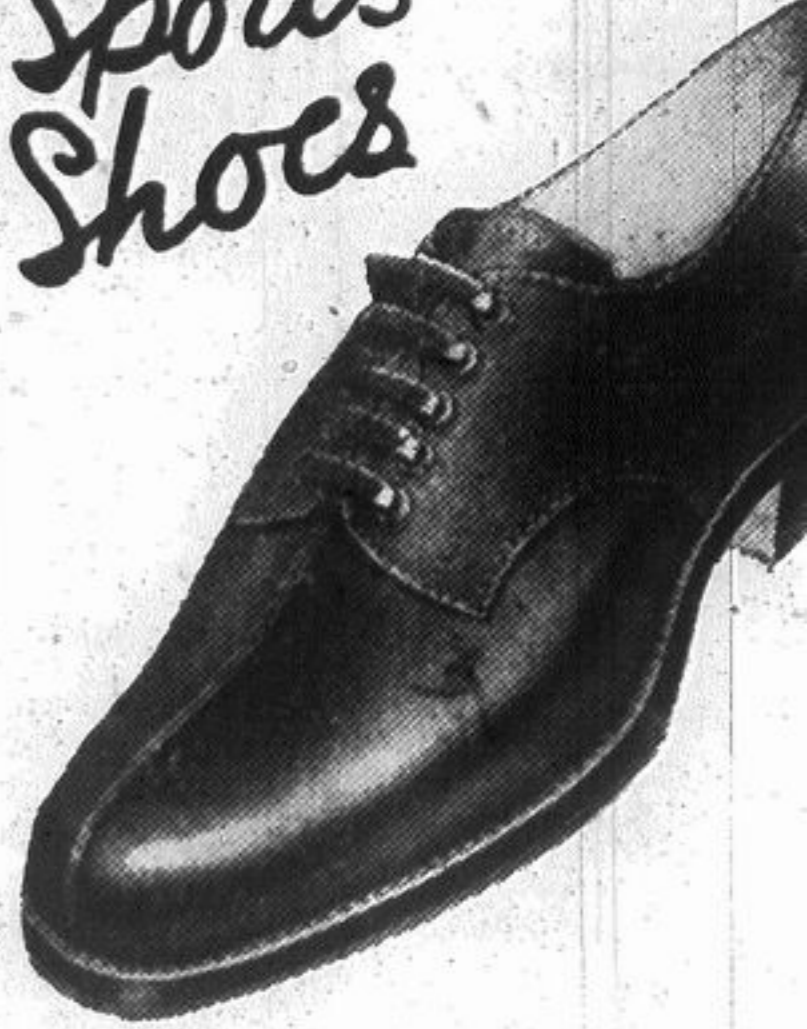
