SILAGE FROM WHEAT CROP

Commenting on the forward condition of early sown corn and the need for checking growth to avoid lodging, H. I. Moore, writing in "The Farmer and Stock-Breeder," says that up to four tons of silage per acre can be cut from forward wheat without seriously affecting the final yield of grain. Much more important is the fact that by cutting, the length of straw is reduced by six inches, he continues.
