tion of liability would have been decided before any demand was made on him. He submitted it was not just on the part of the rating authority to rate him, knowing very well that this was a mine, and it was also unjust to deprive him of his right to appeal. Furthermore, it was unjust to proceed for the recovery of rates pending the hearing of an appeal. All he asked was that the two matters be taken together—the question of his liability to be first determined, and, when that was done, he was prepared to pay his rates and lodge in Court the total amount of the rates sued for. A great injustice had been done to him in taking over his property without compensation, in the first place, and, secondly, by rating him when the person on the other side of the river escaped rating, and, in the third place, by issuing the summons before he had the chance of bringing the question before the Court. He had no objection to lodging the money in full, but there was no hope of getting back anything he paid, because no provision was made in the Act for such refund, and if the Justice made an order, it must stand.

The Justice said that if this appeal was decided in Judge Comyn's favour there would be a refund.

Judge Comyn replied that there was no authority under which there would be a refund, and, from his experience of the County Council, there would be no desire.

The Justice said he would have to be satisfied as to the law on the matter, and he would adjourn the case to the Ennis Court on 15th inst

L.S.F. MAN'S DEATH

The death took place at a Cork hospital some days ago of Mr. Michael Larkin, formerly of Tullylease, who was resident in Dromcollogher for many years. His death at a comparatively early age is sincerely regretted by a large circle of friends, amongst whom he was deservedly and universally popular. He was a Squad Leader in the Dromcollogher Group, L.S.F., and an earnest member up to the time of his illness. The funeral, which took place at Tullylease, was very largely attended.
