OBITUARY

MR. THOMAS O'BRIEN.

It is with feelings of sincere regret that we announce the death of Mr. Thomas O'Brien, 3 Treaty gh and Ahane at that famous Terrace, Limerick, which took place rather unexpectedly on Sunday, March 5th, at Barrington's Hospital after a very short iliness. His death came as a great shock to his family, brother and sisters, and a wide circle of relatives and friends. The late Thomas O'Brien was a very devout Catholic and from an early age was associated with the National Movement. During the War for Independence, 1920-21, he was arrested, and his home raided by the Black and Tans. He also took a prominent part in the lock-out strike as a protest against British occupation His funeral, which in Ireland. took place from St. Munchin's Church, was representative of all sections of the community, including Mr. Dan Bourke T.D., and was a testimony to the esteem in which he was held.
