Dairy cows and in-calf heifers; entry at 71 was one of the heaviest of the season, and included a considerable number of good and promising heifers without any outstanding lots; bidding for both cows and heifers not as free at previous markets, but with a very large attendance of buyers sales were effected for the greater portion of the entry, resulting in a substantial turnover; cows were harder to place than heifers. Top price for in-calf heifers was paid by Mr. Thomas Hogan, Ralahine, Market-on-Fergus, and Mr. James Moroney, Moyle, Broadford, Co. Clare, at £31 10s. In-calf and calved heifers, best, £30 to 10s.; second run, £27 15s. to £29; others, to £25 10s.; small, £16 to £19. Dairy cows—Best, £25 5s. to £27 5s.; second run, to £24; others, £18 to 21 10s. Cows—Considerable increase in entries, mostly comprising young cattle; strong cattle, though in short supply, were again difficult to place; a number of good pens failing to reach their reserves. The trade for yearlings showed an improvement compared with recent weeks, and with some really choice lots on a considerable number were sold. Top price in this department being obtained by Mr. Leonard, Ballysimon, at £15 5s. Two year-bullocks and heifers, £13 to £17; yearlings, best, £13 10s. to £15 5s.; second run, 7s. 6d. to £12; bullocks, best, £10 2s. 6d. to 11 10s.; second run, £8 to £9 18s.—Louis de Courcy, Auctioneer.
