Dairy cows and in-calf heifers; the entry at Saturday's market in this department numbered 87 head, which showed an increase on last week's highest entry of the season. The entry included some outstanding lots of heifers and cows. The number of buyers present was one of the best of the season; all out to buy; good heifers and cows freely sold. The price of heifers being in particularly good demand; a remarkably good clearance was effected; the turn over again exceeding last week's record figure for this season. Mr. John Vaughan, Newtown, Clonlara, topped the market at £41 10s. for a perfect type of dairy cow. Patrick Vaughan, Lanahrone, Corbally, topped the market in the in-calf heifer department at £36 for an outstanding roan heifer, the purchaser being Mr. William Penny. Mr. Vaughan's batch of heifers averaged almost £10s. In-calf and calved dairy cows, best, £10s. to £41 10s.; second run, £26 5s. to £30 5s.; others, £18 15s. to £24.
