Mr. S. He got home-leave and his wife ill, as a result of his over-stayed his leave, that on he got irregular employment, and was in frequent receipt of the dole, on which he kept his wife and family.

The accused who expressed a desire to speak on his own behalf, having paid rent and light he was only three shillings a week to his wife was delicate and considered stout by the doctor, and was unable to buy it for her, and was in jail since the beginning of the year.

The accused was put back for

his trial, the arrangements for the sittings of the Circuit Court would have to be altered. Later his Lordship said he would not impose any sentences until Thursday.

LECTURE IN LIMERICK

Under the auspices of Muintir na Tire, Commander B. T. Coote, Director of Welfare and Recreation, Civics Institute of Ireland, Dublin, delivered an illustrated lecture in the Limerick Technical Institute Hall last night "On Playgrounds For Children."

Mr. C. V. O'Malley, B.C., presided, said that Commander Coote was an authority on the subject of playgrounds and administration of children's playgrounds. In Limerick they were making a forward move in the provision of children's playgrounds, and Muintir na Tire, who had assumed responsibility for their administration, was going to obtain the services of Commander Coote.

In the course of his lecture Commander Coote dealt with the measures taken in Dublin to provide recreation centres for children, who, as a result, were kept off the street and given opportunity to amuse themselves in healthy and safe surroundings. He dealt with the segregation of boys and girls and the measures taken to ensure that the children had facilities for recreation under ideal conditions.

On the proposition of Dr. J. Troy, seconded by Mr. J. P. Lyons, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the lecturer, who suitably replied.
