I make a special appeal to those parents whom God has blessed with happy, healthy children around them in their homes to-night. NOT A FORMALITY

JUSTICE AND BAIL BONDS

That going bail for a person is not a mere formality, was stated by District Justice Kenny, B.L., at Charleville Court. The remark came out of an adjourned prosecution against Patrick Cronin, Brogagh, Charleville, for the larceny of a bicycle value £7, the property of Joseph Madden.

Supt. Kelly, G.S., Mallow, said the defendant failed to turn up for trial at the April Court and there was no trace of him since the offence was committed on 16th March; defendant was subsequently arrested and charged before Peace Commissioner and remanded on bail to the Charleville April Court. When he failed to appear at the last Court a bench warrant was issued and an application was being made that day to have the recognizance entered into by the surety estreated.

Sergt. Duggan said he understood that the defendant had joined the British Forces in Northern Ireland.

DEATH OF OLD I.R.A. MAN

Michael Dwane and Mrs. Dwane, New Line South, Charleville, in eloquent expression on Monday when the funeral took place at the Solemn Office and Requiem Mass at Holy Cross Church, Charleville. Members of the clergy from the Dioceses of Cloyne and Limerick, as well as a big gathering of laity, attended for the purpose of paying final honours to the memory of the young student, who was due for Ordination to the priesthood next month, and whose life was cut short after a brief illness. Deceased, whose father, a popular and highly esteemed master at Charleville, was a pupil of the Christian Brothers Schools, Charleville, where he received his early education, afterwards going to St. Columba's Seminary at the age of 14. On a brilliant course there he entered Maynooth College to prepare for his priestly career. When his health gave way some weeks ago and he was removed to St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin, for treatment, hopes were entertained of his recovery, but unfortunately these proved premature, and he passed away peacefully on Friday afternoon, 12th inst. To his father and mother, sisters and relatives sincere sympathy will be extended in their sad bereavement. On Monday business was completely suspended in Charleville during the Mass and funeral, while the number of people, representing all classes and sections of the community, testified in a striking manner to the sympathy felt for the deceased's parents in their great sorrow.
