### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, May 17th—Cattle—Substantial entries again on offer; numbers well up to last week's high figure; class well represented. Good attendance, including shipping and local interests. Nice entry of beef; firm demand for medium weighted heifers and bullocks; plainer lots met an easier trade. Fresh young cows, the best class, met a free sale and easily placed; secondary and older sorts dull and difficult to clear. In the store cattle section trade was not as brisk as last market; the dry weather affecting trade; useful forward sale, bullocks were wanted and met a fair price; the right stamp changed hands at all recent rates. Nicely bred two year-old heifers and bullocks were cashed around previous level, but backward and plain sorts hard to negotiate. Yearlings a smaller entry; steady trading trade for choice heifers, and fair enquiry for useful sorts. A substantial volume of business transacted; fair clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, £29 10s. to £32 10s.; second run, £21 10s. to £27 5s.; fat cows, best, 8 10s. to £32 10s.; second run, £24 to £27; 1, £11 5s. to £19. Two year-old bullocks and heifers, best, £18 10s. to £22 10s.; second run, 13 10s. to £18; yearlings, best, £11 17s. 6d. to £13 15s.; second run, £6 16s. to £10 10s.  
**Sheep**—An extra heavy supply; all pen accommodation again filled; a good turnout of button. Usual attendance. Trade firm and ready for well fed sheep; prime wethers easily placed. Best hoggets enquired for and sold at all rates; prices for best sheep well up to last market; secondary and rough sorts tedious and not so easy to sell; slightly lower rates. Fresh young ewes a good trade. Large number of store hoggets cashed around previous level. Choice fat lambs freely bid for at top rates. Over the day prices worked out around last week's quotations. Considering the heavy entry an exceptionally good clearance effected. Fat lambs, best, 130/- to 145/-; second run, 115/- to 126/-; clipped, 105/- to 115/-; second run, 90/- to 104/-; hoggets, best (in wool), 110/- to 125/-; second run, 82/6 to 95/-; clipped, 99/- to 110/-; second run, 60/- to 97/6; fat lambs, best, 80/- to 85/-; second run, 50/-—Wm.
