Wednesday, May 24th—Cattle—Smaller numerical dimensions; a most useful description; good entry of beef, which was readily placed at full terms, especially handy weighted heifers. Nicely done fat cows easily placed; current rates. Old cows and strippers hard to sell unless at reduced prices. Complete clearance in the beef section. Useful forward stores in demand and found plenty of customers. The backward condition of pastures had its effect on the young cattle trade, which moved in a quieter routine, and was a bit difficult; coloury dairy heifers and yearling heifers met a good selling trade; useful two year-old bullocks came in for fair attention. The store trade was not up to last week; plainer sorts difficult to cash; rates around previous level. Good attendance and fair clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, £31 to £37; second run, £26 to £30 5s.; fat cows, best, £26 10s. to £31; second run, £22 to £26; old, £12 to £17 10s.; two year-old and two and a half year-old bullocks and heifers, £23 to £25 10s.; second run, £15 5s. to £18; yearlings, £11 10s. to £13 2s. 6d.; second run, £8 10s. to £10.

Sheep—630 penned; the turnout a useful character. Trade opened firm and steady; the number of nice pens kept rates on an even level; buyers had a good percentage of the right class to draw from. Promising wethers and hoggets easily placed, and well fed sheep freely bid for; last week's rates fully maintained. Suitable store hoggets active enquiry and sharp demand; steady rates. Young ewes a good trade; stores cashed around previous level. Nice fat lambs easily cashed and enquired for. All round trade well supported; one of the biggest entries of the season, with a substantial turnover and clearance.
