THE SHANNON BORE

A river bore is the wave caused by the turn of the tide. This is not visible in many rivers; the Shannon is one in which it may be observed. Owing to the present phenomenally low state of the Shannon and the calm weather it may be seen any day. When the water is dead low, and almost motionless, this wave, 8 inches to 12 inches high, suddenly comes along followed by the rush of the incoming tide.

In rough weather, or when the river is in flood, it will not be seen. The highest bores are in the Bay of Funday and the Ganges, where the wave of the incoming tide rushing in often attains a height of 7 to 8 feet.

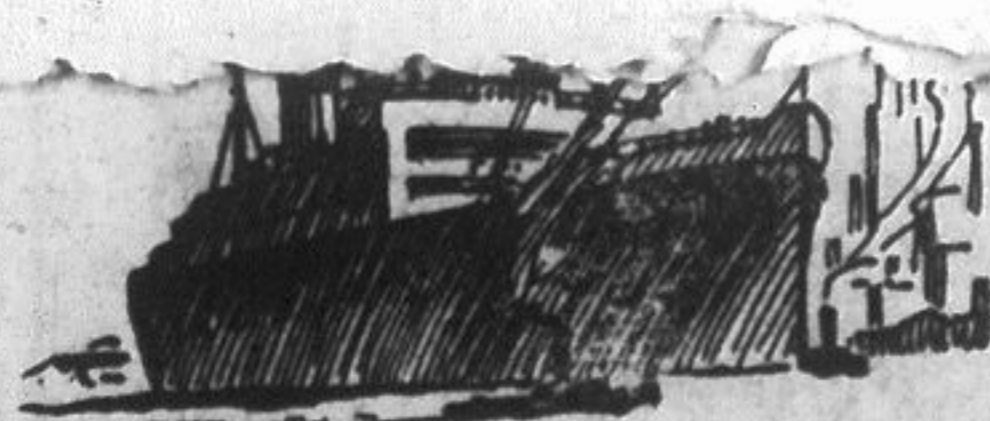
