OBITUARY

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MR. MORTIMER REIDY, BALLY- ENGLAND, ASKEATON

It is with feelings of deepest sympathy we record the death of Mr. Mortimer (Gus) Reidy, son of Mr. Thomas Reidy, Ballinafina, Ardpatrick, which took place at the Co. Hospital, Croom, on the 1st July, after a prolonged illness. Deceased, who was in his early twenties, had, from his early youth, resided with his cousins, the Wallace family, at Ballyengland, Askeaton. He was of a quiet, unassuming nature and was exceptionally popular in his native parish, Ardpatrick, as well as in the parish of his adoption, Askeaton, and surrounding districts.

His remains were removed from the Co. Hospital, Croom, to Askeaton Catholic Church on Saturday evening and were interred in the family burial ground, Castletown, Pallaskenry, on the following day in the presence of a very large and representative gathering of mourners.

The Askeaton Coy. L.D.F., of which deceased was an active member, formed a guard of honour at the graveside and after a farewell volley was fired and the Last Post sounded, the remains were laid to rest.

The officiating clergy were—Rev. Father Casey, P.P., and Rev. Father Rea, C.C., Askeaton.
