met a quieter trade, unless for nicely done  
thin sized heiferish cows; practically all  
lots cleared. The store cattle section com-  
principally two year-olds and yearlings,  
included some useful drafts of well-bred  
calves, for which there was a steady demand,  
especially heifers; enquiry being the best for  
several weeks; choice cattle, a trifle dearer,  
but well-bred yearlings with colour fairly good  
and a ready sale; better rates. Over  
day there was all round steady selling  
for promising and useful cattle, and a  
satisfactory clearance effected. Fat  
calves and bullocks, best, £27 to £30 10s.;  
second run, £22 to £26 15s.; fat cows, £26 to  
15s.; second run, £20 to £22 5s.; old, £14  
18 15s. Two year-old bullocks and heifers,  
£17 10s. to £23 2s. 0d.; second run, £12  
16 10s.; yearlings, £11 5s. to £13 15s.;  
second run, £8 to £10 5s. Sheep—Shorter  
days; mixed class. Full attendance of  
buyers; trade opened rather quiet; buyers a  
cautious. However, there was fairly good  
trade for best pens, and rates repeated

in steady demand. Ewes a quiet trade.  
Hoggets and lambs cashed around previous  
days. Choice fat lambs fit for the trade met
