LIMERICK MAN DIES IN AMERICA

It is with very deep regret that we have to announce the death of Mr. Joseph R. Clancy, in the presence of his sorrowing family, after receiving the last Rites of Holy Church, at his residence in New York, on the 10th May, 1944. "Joe," as he was affectionately called by a large number of friends and acquaintances, first saw the light of day in Garryowen, Limerick, on the 18th April, 1870, and, after working in his native city as pork-butcher, emigrated to the U.S.A. in the late "90s." On arrival in New York he obtained employment in the International Provision Company as master butcher, and remained in the company's employment until forced to retire through ill-health. During the long number of years that he was connected with the company he endeared himself to his employers and work-mates alike and was held in the highest esteem by all. There are few indeed who hailed from Limerick City who at some time or another did not experience his goodness and generosity; he never spared himself where a fellow Limerick man was concerned (especially those who were less fortunate than himself) in obtaining employment for them. He was always well to the fore where cases of distress were brought to his notice and if death intervened he saw to it that his fellow citizen got a decent burial.

The late Mr. Clancy, since his boyhood, took a prominent part in furthering the cause of a free and independent Ireland. He was a life member of the Limerick Men's B. & S. Association of New York, and, in company with his family and an old school mate, Mr. Dan Doyle, and his family, of Bayside Hills, attended the last St. Patrick's Day Ball in New York. The deceased and Mr. Dan Doyle were school fellows at the Long Can Christian Brothers' School in Clare Street, Limerick, and remained fast friends up to the last.

The funeral, after Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his soul, left the Church of the Holy Name of Jesus for Holy Cross Cemetery, Brooklyn, where the remains of a genial and warmhearted Irishman were laid to rest. The cortege was very large and was well attended by his fellow citizens and representatives of the commercial and professional life of the city, which testified to the popularity of the deceased. Mr. Clancy was one of the founders of St. Mary's Hall in Mary Street, Limerick.

The chief mourners were—Mrs. Hanora Clancy (nee Quirke) (wife); John J., Patrick H. (Deputy Chief of the New York Fire Department); Joseph F. (Patrolman City Police, N.Y.) (sons); Mrs. May E. McIntyre, Cornelius McIntyre, Patrolman City Police, N.Y.; Katherine M. Hannon, Eileen P. Wagner (relatives) and eleven grandchildren.

The sympathy of the public and his old friends in Limerick is extended to the widow and family in their bereavement. R.I.P.
