

OBITUARY

MR. TOMMY CAMPION, ASHILL, KILMALLOCK.

The unexpected demise of the late Mr. Tommy Campion, Ashill, Kilmallock, was one of those sad events which aroused the deepest sympathy in the hearts of all who knew him but particularly with those who had intimate association with him and knew to the full his many sterling qualities. He was every inch a man, sympathetic with those in distress and not the least of his good attributes was his charity to those who, he felt, needed a helping hand. He was a son of the late Mr. Thomas Campion, the famous All-Ireland footballer of the late eighties and a member of a family with wide connections throughout the county.

His death took place on the 10th ult., and the remains were conveyed that evening to the Church of SS. Peter and Paul, Kilmallock, when a very large cortege paid a tribute of respect and esteem to the memory of the deceased, as well as sympathy to his sorrowing wife and relatives. Solemn Office and Requiem Mass was celebrated on Wednesday for the repose of his soul. The celebrant was Rev. C. J. Moriarty, C.C., Kilmallock; deacon, Rev. J. Carroll, C.C., Bruff; sub-deacon, Rev. J. Leonard, C.C., Bulgaden. Right Rev. Dean Mulcahy, P.P., Kilmallock, presided. Other priests present were:—Very Rev. S. O'Dea, P.P., Dromin; Rev. M. McCarthy, C.C., Effin; Rev. Father Kennedy, C.C., Dromin. The funeral to the family burial ground at Ballygaddy was of immense size, and gave further indication of the respect and sorrow felt over the entire community. All business houses were closed at its passage through the town.

FARMER SUE

Alleged Breach Contract

At Kilmallock Civil Bill Court before Mr. H. L. Conner, B.L., William Hanley (junior), sued with the consent of his father, William Hanley (senior), his claim against Daniel Flynn, Kilmallock, for £25 for damages for breach of contract.

Mr. L. Walsh, solicitor (Messrs. Bennett and Walsh), appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. D. Fleming, for defendant.

Plaintiff stated he was 20 years of age and entered the employment of Daniel Flynn this year for £52 on the 1st of January. He used to finish work every evening at 6 o'clock (old time). He had been employed by Mr. Flynn the year before, and this year there was difficulty up to the 3rd of February. He had eight cows milked on the evening of the 3rd. The defendant abused him about breaking a pump that had gone out of order. He had ordered the pump and found a stone in it. He could not put back the pump right. Mr. Flynn was in a temper. There was a heifer after calving about 12 o'clock, and when the defendant asked him to milk her, he said he was going into his shop first. This was about half past 12, and, having come down, he asked the defendant for a few shillings as the answer he got from Mr. Flynn was to "hop it." He would give him the money that was going to him or the few shillings he asked. Michael Kelly, the other boy in Mr. Flynn's employment, was present at the time. Plaintiff went away and did not back the following day, the 4th of April, and the Mrs. came out and started talking about things. Plaintiff asked for his hire and was refused. He told Mr. Flynn it would be to carry him far and he said "I will carry me as far as it would do you." Kelly left also and Mr. Flynn got two men in their place. Plaintiff tried to get alternative employment. He worked for a week for Mr. O'Dea, of Bruree. He gave him £1 for five days, and he then found that his solicitor had told him he could be prosecuted for getting him employment. Plaintiff gave an account of other places where he sought employment. When he was working for Patrick O'Dea, Daniel Flynn came and got O'Dea to sack him and he told
