FATAL ACCIDENT

DEATH OF MR. JAMES M. CROWLEY

We regret to announce the sad death of Mr. James M. Crowley (47), 40 Collins Avenue, Dublin, which occurred after an accident on the 27th ultimo. Mr. Crowley, who was a native of Ballylanders, Co. Limerick, was a higher executive officer in the Department of Local Government and Public Health. Deceased was brother of Senator Tadhg Crowley, Rev. Patrick Crowley, and two other brothers—Mr. Peter Crowley, Employment Branch, Department of Industry and Commerce, with whom he lived, and Mr. John Crowley, Spittal, who died two years—took part in the Cork Jail hunger strike in 1920.

He took a prominent part in the national movement, and during the Civil War fought with the Republican Forces in the West Limerick Flying Column. His father, Mr. Timothy Crowley, who died in 1921, soon after the burning of his home at Ballylanders, Co. Limerick, by Black-and-Tans, was a Fenian. His mother, Mrs. Ellen Crowley, is 85.

Mr. Crowley worked for some time in the National Bank in Carlow. He volunteered for service in the Local Government Department of the First Dail and was an Inspector. He was reinstated in the Department of Local Government and Public Health over ten years ago. For a time he was an official in the Mallow Sugar Beet Factory. The remains were removed from Jervis Street Hospital, Dublin, to Ballylanders on Saturday. Rev. T. B. Condon, C.C., Pro-Cathedral, officiated.
