REFEREE REPORT

TO RECENT COMMENT

(To the Editor, "Limerick Leader.") Dear Sir—There has been much controversy and some Press comments over the goal of Mick Mackey in the Hurling Final that I feel to me to explain to the public my view of the score and to state what happened and the rules bearing it.

1. The referee starts the play by blowing his whistle sounding for a play which does not count.

2. What is called the "tag" rule operates only when a player is fouled after he has entered the ball. Under this rule a play from which the score has taken place before the sounds.

(See rule 14, sub-head 1, in the rules.)

3. In the Thurles game Mackey was fouled by a player when in possession of the whistle for a free and whistle sounding Mick delivered the ball, which went into the goal space. The incident came under rule 14 above and could not do anything else I did. Do Chara,
