**THE SAVOY**—The intimate and true story of the "Fighting Sullivans," which will be shown at the Savoy all next week, is an extremely moving and poignant film of five Irish brothers who joined the U.S. Navy together, served together and died together. Thomas Mitchell himself an Irishman was the perfect choice for Tom Sullivan, the boys' father. Miss Trudy Marshall was selected for the part of Genevieve and Selma Royle as the mother, with Anne Baxter in the leading feminine role. The picture takes us into the Sullivan home—the ordinary home of an ordinary family. Early in life they become known as "the fighting Sullivans" and the title sticks. If one gets into trouble, the others rush to the scene. The only threat of a division comes when "Small Change" falls in love with Katherine Mary (Anne Baxter). However, she wins their approval and the team remains unbroken. The film is a saga of courage and is told with deep understanding and humour. One of Fox's biggest attractions for this year, it comes direct from its three weeks Eire Premiere run in Dublin.

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**THE GRAND CENTRAL**—Superb, witty and gay entertainment is provided by "The Beautiful Cheat," which comes to the Grand Central on Monday next for one week. The film is said to give Rosalind Russell her greatest role to date. Details of the plot cannot be revealed here, as the entire production is of the "surprise" variety.
