RESTRICTION ON THRESHING CHARGES.

The Government has made an Order entitled the Emergency Powers (No. 337) Order, 1944, which prohibits any person from making a charge for the hire of a portable threshing set or for the threshing of any cereal during the period commencing on 1st September, 1944, and ending on 31st August, 1945, exceeding by more than 12½ per cent. the charge which was current in his locality during the period commencing on 1st September, 1941, and ending on 31st March, 1942.

MRS. K. POWER, KILMALLOCK.
