DAILY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Monday, September 13th.—Cattle—Sub-increased supplies, the largest of the year and a good show; more fat and for sale. Representative attendance of buyers and shipping interests fully represented. Beef met a firm selling trade, medium weight heifers; handy weight heifers were also in strong demand, and easily sold at full current values. Fresh young calves met a firm market; better rates; and older sorts also moved freely; this section active; market almost steady. Useful feeding bullocks with quality hands at late rates. Young stores, including useful drafts of utility feeders; trade in this section steady with improvement, except for choice yearling heifers, which were in fair demand. Other classes lower rates had to be accepted. Fair clearance. Fat heifers and calves, £25 to £31 5s.; small, £20 to £23 5s.; cows, best, £23 5s. to £28 5s.; second run, £15 to £23; old, £12 10s. to £17; 2½ year old bullocks, £22 15s. to £26; second run, £12 10s.; 1½ year old heifers, best, £14 18s.; second run, £11 10s. to £14; 1 year old heifers, £11 10s. to £16. Major E. S. O'Brien obtained the remarkable price of £24 for a young bullock.

PLEMENTARY SHEEP SALE.

Annual fixture was also held to-day, attended, 950, and comprised an excellent lot of fat, store sheep and lambs; small breeding ewes and rams. Strong attendance of buyers. ADDITIONAL ALLOTMENTS SCHEME.

NOTICE TO FENCING CONTRACTORS.

Applications are invited from competent persons for the erection of sod fences around the Council's additional allotments for cottag tenants, in accordance with the specification prepared by the Council's Engineer, Mr. P. J. Sheahan, 47 O'Connell Street, Limerick.

The Council is prepared to allow a sum of 9/- per Irish perch for new fencing; this price to include for the construction of stone gullets as necessary up to a maximum size of 2 square feet, as directed by the Engineer, and for the planting of quicks. If contractors are required to provide quicks, they will be allowed extra payment for them at a rate not exceeding £3 per 1,000. Where repairs to existing fences are required a unit price to be decided by the Engineer and not to exceed 5/- per Irish perch shall be allowed. Where the cross section of any gullet is to exceed 2 square feet this shall be the subject of a separate estimate. The height and base widths of new fences shall both be 4' 6". Detailed specification and plan will be forwarded to all successful applicants.

Applications should be forwarded to Mr. P. J. Sheahan, Engineer, 47 O'Connell Street, Limerick, so as to reach him not later than Thursday 28th September, 1944. Work on the construction of fences will commence on or about the 10th October 1944, as directed by the Engineer. The Council reserves the right to refuse any application which it considers unsatisfactory.
