## SUDDEN DEATHS

### TWO IN LIMERICK

Two sudden deaths are reported to have taken place in Limerick yesterday.

At about 6.30 a.m. some people on their way to Mass observed a man in a sitting position outside a store in Carr Street. On investigation it was found that the man appeared to be dead. The Guards were notified and the body was removed to Barrington's Hospital, where life was found to be extinct. The remains were later identified as those of Patrick Walsh, 50 St. Munchin's St., Island Field. Deceased was married and aged about 53 years. He had been under the care of a doctor for a considerable time past and a post-mortem showed that death was due to heart failure. An inquest was not deemed necessary.

The second sudden death was that of an aged man named Patrick Slattery, Crossagalla. Some time after breakfast the deceased left his house to exercise a greyhound in a nearby field. Later he was discovered in a dying condition in the field and in a short time he expired. It was certified that death was due to heart failure and an inquest was not, in the circumstances, considered necessary.

#### A THIRD DEATH.

Michael Wrenn, an old age pensioner, a native of Murroe, died in the City Home Hospital yesterday from injuries to his throat. The deceased was committed to the County Jail last Wednesday arising out of a charge concerning his injuries and as his condition grew worse he was transferred to hospital, where, as stated, he expired yesterday evening.
