MEMORIAL PROJECT

These soldier-patriots paid the penalty for taking up arms in defence of their country, and it is to be hoped that a generous response will now be made to the appeal for funds for such a worthy object.

DEATH OF MR. T McNAMARA

It is with very deep and sincere regret that we chronicle the demise of Mr. Thomas McNamara, Clondrinagh, Limerick, which took place last night after a long illness.

The late Mr. McNamara was a member of one of the most popular families in the North Liberties and his death has removed an honoured and honourable gentleman from our midst. Genial, kind-hearted, sociable, his was a lovable personality and his passing will occasion profound regret and sorrow.

In his heyday, like his late brother, Mr. John McNamara, Shelbourne, he was an outstanding athlete and over 50 years ago his reputation as a sprinter was nationwide. In his youth, too, he took an active part in field games, being an enthusiastic exponent of the rugby and hurling codes. Up to late years, despite failing health, his love of sport attracted him to fixtures of all kinds, and his passing will be deeply mourned in these circles, as it will, indeed, by the community as a whole.

Deep and heartfelt sympathy will be extended to the sons and daughters and the other members of the family in their bereavement.

It will be recalled that as a reprisal for the shooting of two members of the British forces in Kilmallock the house belonging to the family in that town was blown up in the presence of the inhabitants, who were compelled to witness the carrying out of this act of sabotage.

Deep sympathy will be extended to her highly respected family in their bereavement.

The remains will be removed this evening at 7.30 o'clock to St. Michael's Church. Funeral on Sunday at 2.15 p.m. to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
