 price springers. A few lots of
 year old bullocks were sold at
 prices ranging from £28 to £30 for
 choice lots, and £25 to £27 for
 poorer quality. Good 2 or 2½ year
 olds made £18 to £20. There was
 practically no demand for younger
 cattle of any description. There
 is a small number of beef cattle
 on offer but very few were sold
 at those that were at such con-
 siderably reduced prices as £12 to
 £15. Springer cows were also in
 small numbers and exchanged
 at £27 to £35; poorer sorts
 were sold at £18 to £23. There were
 pigs on offer and young calves
 were unsaleable.

CHEAPER TURF.

Prices of turf in the West Lime-
 rock and Kerry bogs have latterly
 fallen to 25/- and 20/- per ton, ac-
 cording to our Abbeyfeale corres-
 pondent, who adds that much of
 the local demands have been satis-
 fied.
