In the heifer section not many good heifers on offer, but anything showing promise was freely bid for; backward heifers were cashed at prices in favour of purchasers. Good attendance of buyers. The top price of £38 10s. for dairy cows was obtained by Mr. John Brown, Parteen, and Mr. David O'Dwyer, Caherelly, Grange, the runner-up being Mr. D. O'Neill, Dohile, Rathkeale, at £37. Top price for in-calf heifers was obtained by Mr. John Stokes, Milford, Kildimo, at £35 10s.
