DEATH OF RETIRED CIVIL SERVANT

The death took place at his residence in London last week of Mr. John H. Bicknell, retired officer of Customs and Excise. The deceased was son of the late Mr. W. H. Bicknell, of Bicknell's Hotel, Glin, Co. Limerick, and uncle of the present owner of that establishment, Mr. Patrick D. Conway. A member of a widely respected family, he had a very successful career in the Civil Service and was highly and deservedly esteemed by all who knew him.
