COMMERCIAL

TOBACCOS & CIGARETTES:

Maximum rates per oz. for various brands
 and descriptions of tobaccos have been
 fixed by Order. Sale of any of the
 tobaccos otherwise than by weight is pro-
 hibited. Sale by retail of various popular
 brands of cigarettes sold by number is
 prohibited otherwise than in lots of
 multiples of 5. Maximum retail prices for
 these brands have been fixed by Order,
 the cheap grades being 5 for 3d., 10 for 6d.,
 etc.; medium grades without coupons, 5 for
 4½d., 10 for 8½d., etc.; and the more
 expensive grades at varying rates. Details
 of the maximum retail prices fixed for
 tobaccos and cigarettes are contained in the
 Rationing and Price Control Handbook.

Retailers of cigarettes or tobaccos are re-
 quired to keep displayed in their premises in
 conspicuous position a list of their retail prices
 which must not exceed the prices fixed in the
 above-mentioned orders.
