State Pathologist's Report

Finding of Coroner's Jury

"That the cause of death was heart failure, due to atteroma of the coronary arteries," was the verdict returned at the resumed inquest held by Coroner Cleary at Croom County Hespital, on Saturday into the circumstances surrounding the death of Maurice Leeney, 38, coachbuilder and backney car driver, of Ballinleena, Bruree, who was found dead at Fanningstown, pear Groom, on the 23rd May last.

Supt J J Cooney, c s, Adare, represented the Gardai authorities, and Mr O Binchy,

solr, Charleville, for the next-of-kin. The Coroner said evidence was given on the previous occasion to the effect that the decuased was found dead inside a fence near the railway bridge at Fanningstown. and Dr Hedderman, assisted by Dr Cooke,

performed a post mortem examination on the body, and they were not satisfied as to the cause of death, and be took away some of the organs with him to have them analysed. He had since got Dr McGrath's written report, and it agreed with De Hedderman a findings, There were no systems whatsoever of personing, and deceased's death was due to natural causes. de would like that to be known. Deceased had died a natural death, and did not die

from any poisoning.

Dr Hedderman stated that on the instructions of the Coroner he had carried out a post mortem examination of the body of Maurice Leeney on the 23rd May. and found no signs of injury or foul play. There was some atterona of the coronary arteries, congestion of the lungs, kidneys and spisen and uccous membrane of the stomach. Dr Eileen Cooke assisted him at the examination. They could not find sny evidence of the cause of death and considered it advisable to get the assist once of De John McGrath, the State Pathologist. In his opinion the cause of death was heart failure, due to atteroma of the coronary arteries. The Coroner then reports of Dr McGrath
