## DEATH OF MR. M. MOONE, NEWCASTLE WEST

Newcastle West has lost one of its oldest and most esteemed residents by the death of Mr. "Murt" Moone, Maiden Street, who passed away on Saturday morning with unexpected suddenness. Deceased, who appeared to be in his usual good health on the previous evening, was aged about 77 years. Member of a popular and respected family, the late Mr. Moone was one of the few surviving diamond jubilarians of the local Confraternity of the Holy Family, of which he was a member since childhood. He was father of Mr. R. Moone, victualler, Maiden Street, and of Mr. Ed. Moone and Mrs. T. Liston, do. There was a very large and representative attendance at the funeral to Churchtown Cemetery on Sunday.

## BROKE HIS BOND

At Ennis Court, before District Justice D. F. Gleeson, B.L., Supt. J. S. Flynn applied to have recognisances estreated in a case against Michael McCormack, Post Office Lane, who, whilst under a rule of bail, had been convicted of an assault.

It appeared that on the 16th of June McCormack entered into his own bond of £5 to keep the peace for 12 months, but on the 16th of October was convicted and sentenced to a term of imprisonment for assault.
