THE "TAN" DAYS

—oo— RECALLED BY RECENT DEATH

Old I.R.A. men in West Limerick and North Cork will learn with regret of the death of Mr. Edmond Walsh, which took place recently at his residence, Croughteen, Castletown (writes our Ballygran correspondent). During the whole of the troubled period of the Black and Tan regime, the late Mr. Walsh's roof and table were freely at their disposal, and as regularly availed of by "much wanted" men at that time. Although then burdened with the care of an invalid wife—who was just as solicitous for the care and welfare of the "boys" as himself—Ned, as he was known to intimates, never failed in what he considered to be not alone an act of humanity but a compelling duty towards those engaged in the fight for freedom. His friendly roof was also not unknown to some of the Limerick City Volunteers, and one very prominent member of that body was almost invariably to be found at Croughteen, when things were getting too hot in the city; yet there was never a suspicion that he or any other "outlaw" ever passed a night at this quiet country farmhouse, a fact which speaks for itself.

In later days there was a happy sequel when Mr. Walsh's only daughter, now Mrs. Sheehy, became the wife of one of the "wanted men" who had also served throughout as an officer in the North Cork Brigade, although a native of Co. Limerick.

In addition to the local clergy present at his interment at Castletown, there also attended Rev. M. Kully, C.C., Newcastle West and Rev. Peadar Kelly, C.S.Sp., whose late father had been a close friend of deceased for nearly half a century.

—oo— VERDICT OF GUILTY

At the Limerick Circuit Court, before Judge Barra O Briain, S.C., Thomas Condon (junr.), Knockane, Newcastle West, was charged with the manslaughter of Richard Roche, farmer, Mahoonagh, Newcastle West, and Patrick Cussen, farmer, Fanlehane, Newcastle West, at Clouniskehane, on 21st October, 1945, by knocking them down with a lorry.

Mr. T. Donovan, B.L. (instructed by Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor) prosecuted, and Mr. Nolan Whelan, S.C. and Mr. M. V. Fitzgerald, B.L. (instructed by Mr. M. J. K. Dore, solicitor) appeared for the accused.

The hearing opened yesterday, and continued this morning. The Judge commenced addressing the jury at 12 noon, and concluded at 1.15 p.m.

A verdict of guilty was returned against accused.

The accused was put back for sentence until to-morrow morning.
