

in the area the C.E.O. should also be informed of the position so that, should occasion require, steps may be taken to have the proposed new condition rejected.

"Kindly let me have a report at your earliest convenience on the position in your area in regard to this matter."

The Secretary of the Limerick Regional Committee of Vocational Teachers, in the course of his letter, requested the Committee not to adopt the new clause in the event of a request by the Department for same. It was contended that an imposition, as outlined in the clause contemplated by the Department, would, as stated in the General Secretary's communication, place teachers in a state of insecurity. The letter further pointed out that according to memorandum V7 of the Department of Education, Technical Instruction Branch, teachers already qualified may be required to attend courses from time to time specified by the Department with a view to improving their qualifications. It was pointed out in the letter that the effect of the new clause would be to transfer the onus, at present incumbent on the Department, to the Committee.

In reply to the Chairman,

The C.E.O. said that no communication had been received from the Department as outlined in the letter before the meeting.

The Chairman said that he did not consider the matter was before them at all; it didn't arise. It had been brought to the notice of the C.E.O., but not before the Committee.

The C.E.O. suggested leaving the matter over until it arose.

Mr. Hartney said that he agreed that the question of adopting or not adopting the Department's clause was not before the meeting at all, as no communication had been received. It was a good thing however, to know the attitude of the teachers on the matter.

The C.E.O. here suggested that a reply be forwarded, to the effect that in the event of such an occasion arising, when the Department would request the adoption of a certain clause that the points raised in the letter would be borne in mind.

Mr. Casey said that they would certainly have to defer consideration of the matter. The Committee took a certain line of action on the question before and he thought that they should adhere to that attitude. He thought that a copy of the circular letter from the General Secretary should be sent to each member for perusal. He moved that the matter be deferred pending receipt of a communication from the Department.

This was agreed to unanimously. The Chairman informed the meeting that no decision had, as yet, been received from the Department regarding the appointment of a woodwork teacher.
