WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, February 26th—Full seasonable entry; more choice heifers and cows than last week. The attendance was quite large enough to buy up the market, and included those in quest of top heifers. Business opened rather quietly, and exchange was not easily effected, because some vendors put on prices, buyers were not willing to give, but soon settled down and prices ruled on the higher level; last week's top rates easily maintained, and in the case of really promising heifers of arctic type for milk were exceeded. Business all round showed cohesion and stability, buyers being willing to part top values for the right stamp, so that trade was quick and sharp; the chief lots drew brisk competition; quality, colour and shape commanded attention, and a ready exchange. The right stamp of young cows, five or six years old, in strong demand, and more could have been sold. The two draws of dairy cows for Miss O'Neill, Killealey, Manister, and the reps. of Park, Hickey, Inchabone House, Limerick, sold well. Trade was well sustained and active throughout the day, purchasers ready and willing to invest, with a successful wind up and practical clearance. Top prices for in-calf heifers went to Mr. James O'Brien, Ballynacree, Ballynecity, at £31; and for dairy cows to Mr. James Murnane, Thomondgate, Limerick, at £26 10s. In-calf and culved heifers, promising, £26 5s. to £31; ordinary, £17 5s. to £24 10s.; dairy cows, £29 to £36 10s.; second run, £20 5s. to £23; spring calves, best, £23 to £27 10s.; second run, £19 to £22 10s.; old, £12 10s. to £16 5s.—Wm. WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, February 21st—Cattle—Shorter numbers; beef, full supply, for which there was steady enquiry; prime fat cattle met firm demand and ready exchange; heifers a better trade than bullocks, which were somewhat easier; nicely fed heifers freely bid for and cashed at full current values. Well fed young heiferish cows easily placed; satisfactory trade for good cattle; quality and condition commanded ready buyers; clearance in fat section of the market; secondary and older cows for canning met better trade at slightly firmer rates. Stores with age and condition found willing purchasers. The selection of young cattle on sale was of an ordinary class.
