 (26th February).**

Few calves were on sale, and those offered did not exceed 5/. Local victuallers have been offered more calves than they can dispose of. Farmers state that at present prices for milk at the creamery, it does not pay to feed calves on milk in the absence of other feeding stuffs which helped. In other days £2,000 to £3,000 was often paid for calves at this market. General prices:—Farmers' butter, 2/2 per lb.; eggs, 2/3 per doz.; turkeys, 1/10 per lb.; geese, 1/3; chickens, 1/4; hens, 10d.; ducks, 1/-; potatoes, 1/3 per stone; straw, 2/6 per cwt.; hay, £3 to £10 per ton; turf, 35/- per ton; turnips, £2 5s.
