CIRCULATION OF ORDERS.

I will, as suggested, make out the orders dealing with the more important matters and have them circulated, but I would suggest that we make a start at the beginning of the financial year, 1st April next. We are now very busy dealing with the estimate.

Mr. Quish—I'm quite prepared to wait until April.
Chairman—That is agreed to, then.

ABBEYFEALE MARKETS (26th February).

Few calves were on sale, and those offered did not exceed 5/-. Local victuallers have been offered more calves than they can dispose of. Farmers state that at present prices for milk at the creamery, it does not pay to feed calves on milk in the absence of other feeding stuffs which helped. In other days £2,000 to £3,000 was often paid for calves at this market. General prices:—Farmers' butter, 2/2 per lb.; eggs, 2/3 per doz.; turkeys, 1/10 per lb.; geese, 1/3; chickens, 1/4; hens, 10d.; ducks, 1/-; potatoes, 1/3 per stone; straw, 2/6 per cwt.; hay, £8 to £10 per ton; turf, 35/- per ton; turnips, £2 5s.
