BARRINGTON'S BANK

At a meeting of Limerick Corporation held last night the Mayor (Ald. J. Reidy, T.D.) presiding,

Mr. M. J. Keyes, T.D., said that steps should be taken by the Council to acquire Barrington's bank with a view to having it made passable. At present the embankment was private property and the Corporation was powerless to have repairs carried out.

Mr. Hartney said that it was a serious reflection on the Corporation to permit this embankment, which at one time was a very popular promenade, to fall into decay.

Mr. Russell—What is the legal position with regard to this embankment?

Mayor—It is private property.

Ald. O'Malley—During the regime of the former Manager I informed him that the owners were prepared to vest the embankment in the Corporation on the conditions laid down by the Manager. That offer remains good.

Acting Manager—I will take this question up and see what we can do to acquire the embankment.

PIKE FISHING
