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## BICYCLE SOLD FOR £15

Before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., at Newcastle West Court on Friday, 9th inst.

Sean Hartney, auctioneer, Shanid, Shanagolden, was prosecuted for selling a pedal cycle at £15, which was in excess of the maximum controlled price.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. Listen and Co., solicitors), defending, admitted a technical offence, and explained that defendant, who was a new auctioneer, sold the bicycle at a clearance sale of general articles. The cycle was put up for auction and defendant tried to get the last shilling for the owner. Eventually it was knocked down for £15 and fees to a Mr. Foley, of Limerick. Defendant refunded the money when his attention was drawn to the fact that he could not charge more than £8 for a used cycle.

An inspector said Mr. Foley purchased articles at the auction, including the bicycle, and gave defendant a cheque for £58 7s. to cover the lot. That night he stopped the cheque and issued another cheque for the correct amount, allowing £8 for the bicycle.

Mr. Noonan said defendant wasn't aware at the time that the Order referred to cycles sold at public auctions. The cycle was not the auctioneer's property but was sold on behalf of another party.

The Justice imposed a fine of £1 and said that only for the circumstances as explained the penalty would have been £50. He wanted it to be clearly understood that articles covered by the Emergency Powers Orders could not be sold by public auction in excess of the controlled prices.

The death took place at her residence, Old Kildimo, Co. Remains were removed from the Parish Church, Kildimo, on Monday, the 12th inst., to the local churchyard. The officiating clergy at the graveside were Very Rev. Canon Wallace, P.P., and Rev. Fr. The chief mourners were Daniel O'Loughlin (husband), Michael, Charles, John (sons), Margaret, Catherine, Mary (daughters), Charles, John (brothers), Mary and Ellen (sisters),; Mary, Bridget, Margaret, Ellen (nieces); James, Michael, John, Patrick (nephews), and a large circle of friends. The funeral was very largely attended.

### DISPUTE OVER PASSAGE

At Limerick High Court Circuit sitting, before Mr. Justice Davitt, Michael Walsh, Derrybeg, appealed against a decree for 1/- damages, with a title jurisdiction, awarded to Bertie O'Shaughnessy, Derrybeg, by the Circuit Judge on 23rd November last.

Mr. S. Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Mr. Noel Shee, solicitor), appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. G. Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Mr. T. E. O'Donnell, solicitor), for appellant.

The dispute arose over a passage leading from O'Shaughnessy's house and which defendant claimed he was entitled to use.

Having heard the evidence, his Lordship dismissed the appeal.
