Bonus For Employees

At the meeting of the Limerick Corporation last night, the Mayor Ald. James Reidy, T.D., presided. The other members present were:— Ald. D. Bourke, T.D.; Ald. John Carew, Councillors M. J. Keyes, T.D.; J. M. Casey, C. V. O'Malley; P. J. Donnellan, G. E. Russell, P. J. Cusack, M. Hartney.

The officials in attendance were: Mr. M. F. Donnellan, Acting Manager; Mr. G. J. Killeen, Assistant Town Clerk; Mr. J. J. Dundon, Law Agent; Mr. C. Stenson, B.E., City Surveyor, and Dr. James McPolin, S.M.O.H.

The Acting Manager (Mr. M. F. Donnellan) stated that he had received an application from the Corporation employees for an additional bonus on foot of an agreement. He had given 1/2, but the men contended that the agreement provided for a bonus of 2/-. He did not agree with that contention.

Mr. Cusack, Mr. Keyes, Mr. Casey, Mr. Hartney and Ald. Bourke urged that a bonus of 2/- be given.

The Acting Manager said that he would submit the question to the Department.

Mr. Hartney alluded to the good work that was being done in the People's Park by the new gardener, Mr. Kennedy, who was, he said, an excellent man.

Mayor—The park is a credit to him.

Mr. C. V. O'Malley urged that new avenues on the Prospect Roaming scheme should be either named or numbered for identification purposes.

Acting Manager—I will go into that matter and make a recommendation to the next meeting.

Ald. Carew said that the men employed on relief works should be paid the wage paid to builders' labourers. He agreed that these men had a genuine grievance.

Acting Manager—I will investigate the position and report to the next meeting.

Mr. Cusack alluded to the condition of the Kilkeedy Graveyard and said that it was an absolute disgrace to the city.

Ald. Carew—It is in a terrible condition—it is a shocking sight.

City Surveyor—I will examine the cemetery to see what improvements can be carried out.

Mr. C. V. O'Malley called attention to the necessity of keeping the small park at Barrington's Pier in better trim.

City Surveyor—I will have the grass trimmed and the place tidied up generally.

OBITUARY

MR. JAMES RYAN, FERRYBRIDGE.

The death took place at his residence, Ferrybridge, Clonlara, Co. Limerick, on Wednesday, April 11th, of Mr. James Ryan, son of the late William Ryan, Corcomore, Clonlara, and Mrs. E. Ryan.

Decedent, who played a very prominent part in the War of Independence, was transport officer to the West Limerick Brigade, I.R.A., and gave himself wholeheartedly to the cause of freedom. His services were ever at the disposal of those engaged in the fight for freedom, and his regretted demise in the early years of middle age recall to mind memories of the gallant struggle in Limerick and North Cork.

The memorable rescue of J. J. Hogan from Knocklong, in which Dan Green, Seamus Robinson and Sean Tracey figured, reached its climax when Jim Ryan drove the rescued Volunteer to safety.

During the campaign in Charleville and around Kanturk, Jim's constant companion was the late Sean Finn, Brigadier, West Limerick Brigade. Jim was also associated with Mick Brennan in the retreat from Killaloe after the memorable fight in which Volunteer Scully lost his life, as also he was engaged in the transfer from Limerick to Clare of General Lucas, the captured British General, who was so sensationaly kidnapped by the I.R.A.

Another companion was Tom Malone, known as Sean Forde, Limerick, and Pat Ryan, of Anagh East Limerick, who fell in the War of Independence, was a first cousin of the deceased.

Also among his companions of that period was Mr. Michael Colbert, T.D., who stood among his old companions near the firing party at the graveside.

Of a jovial, kindly and genial disposition, Jim Ryan was universally acknowledged as a general favourite, and was at all times only too ready to use his influence to help anyone in need of advice or assistance.

The sympathy of the people of his own district, and indeed of all the county, is extended to his bereaved widow, Mrs. C. Ryan; to his mother, Mrs. Ryan; to his brother, Mr. W. Ryan; to his sisters, Mrs. Naughton, and the Misses D. and A. Ryan; to his brother-in-law, Mr. J. Stokes, Kildimo, and sister-in-law, Miss H. Stokes, and to all his relatives and friends.

The funeral, which was of huge proportions, was attended by people from all over the district and from the surrounding counties, and took place on Friday, 13th inst., to the family burial ground at Kilkeedy, Ballybrown.

Full military honours were accorded to the remains and the firing party was composed of old comrades of the I.R.A., under the command of Gearoid McAuliffe, O/C, West Limerick Brigade, and the arrangements were in charge of Capt. Cregan.
